Preamble

The licenses for most software are designed to make sure you have the freedom to share and change it. By contrast, the GNU General Public License is intended to guarantee your freedom to share and change free software to make sure you can do all sorts of work.

This license, the Lesser General Public License, applies to some programs which are designed to be used by several programs. The GNU GPL is more general than the LGPL, so you can still use it for the same kind of work, but you must guard your freedom carefully because this license of the ordinary General Public License is the better strategy to use in any particular case, based on the requirements of your program.

When we speak of free software, we are referring to freedom of use, not price. Our General Public Licenses are designed to make sure that you have the freedom to distribute copies of free software (and charge for them if you wish), that you can offer warranty for them, and that you can get it in any form you wish. When we speak of free software, we are referring to freedom of use, not price. Our General Public Licenses are designed to make sure you are free to distribute copies of free software (and charge for them if you wish), that you can change the software and use pieces of it for other programs, and that you are authorized to use the code for other people.

To protect your rights, we need to make restrictions that forbid distributors to deny you these rights or to attempt to impose new ones. These restrictions translate to certain responsibilities for you if you distribute copies of the library or any derivative work.

Most GNU software, including some libraries, is covered by the GNU General Public License. This license, the GNU Lesser General Public License, and the GNU Free Documentation License, are all three different from the ordinary General Public License. We use this license for certain libraries in order to permit linking those libraries into non-free programs.
